

# How to use your Specsavers voucher



## **Your eyecare benefit from your employer**

Your employer has supplied you with a voucher that you can use in any Specsavers store in the UK or Channel Islands. So, what does your voucher get you? And how do you use it? Our quick guide will explain all.

## **What's included with your voucher?**

The benefits depend on which voucher you have:

### **VDU/DSE voucher**

- A full eye and eyesight examination
- One pair of glasses from the £50 range, or £50 towards glasses, when prescription is required solely and specifically for VDU/DSE use
- A further £20 off when you buy glasses from the £100 range with a Premium Club\* voucher

### **Optical care or driving eyecare voucher**

- A full eye and eyesight examination
- One pair of glasses from the £50 range or £50 towards glasses
- A further £20 off when purchasing from the £100 range with a Premium Club\* voucher
- If no prescription is required, a pair of non-prescription sunglasses

### **Safety voucher**

- One complete pair of Specsavers safety glasses, fitted with CR39 single-vision lenses plus scratch-resistant treatment as standard. A second safety voucher will be required to cover standard bifocal or varifocal lenses

# How to use your Specsavers voucher

## Using your voucher

Got your voucher? Great. You simply need to book your eye test online now at **specsavers.co.uk** or call the store you'd like to visit. Remember to take your voucher with you to your appointment and you're all set.

## What to expect from your eye appointment

Before you come in, a couple of things to remember:

- **If you wear glasses** please bring your current pair to your appointment
- **If you wear contact lenses** please bring your glasses, contact lenses and, if you use them, case and solution, as you'll need to remove your lenses for the examination.

## What happens in the eye test?

We'll take a history from you and discuss any concerns you have about your eyes. Your optometrist will ask about your work, general health and family history. We'll carry out a variety of tests to assess different aspects of your eye health and vision.

After the tests, your optometrist will discuss the results and offer any necessary advice. If you need glasses, this includes talking you through lens and frame options to ensure you get the protection you need. Treatment for any eye conditions is also discussed at this point, as well as possible referral to a specialist.

## Try on frames at home

Our Virtual Try On feature means you can see what glasses look like on you, without having to come in store first. So if you see a style you like the look of at **specsavers.co.uk** – whether you're on your phone, tablet or desktop – just click the 'virtual try on' button and see what you think.
